After retiring in 1922, I served Collingwood's committee from 1923-1934 and 1950-1954.

Some say I was Collingwood's first true star player.

After serving as vice captain in 1910 and 1911, I was Collingwood's captain in 1920 and 1921.

I kicked 707 goals in my 230 games.

I kicked the most goals of any player in the competition ten times in a season.

I kicked 11 goals in a game against University.

Born in 1960, I played 313 games for Collingwood.

I won the first of my two Copeland trophies in 1984.

Many said I was too slow and couldn't kick far enough.

After my playing career finished I coached the club for four years.

In the premiership year of 1990 I was captain, won the Copeland Trophy and Norm Smith Medal.

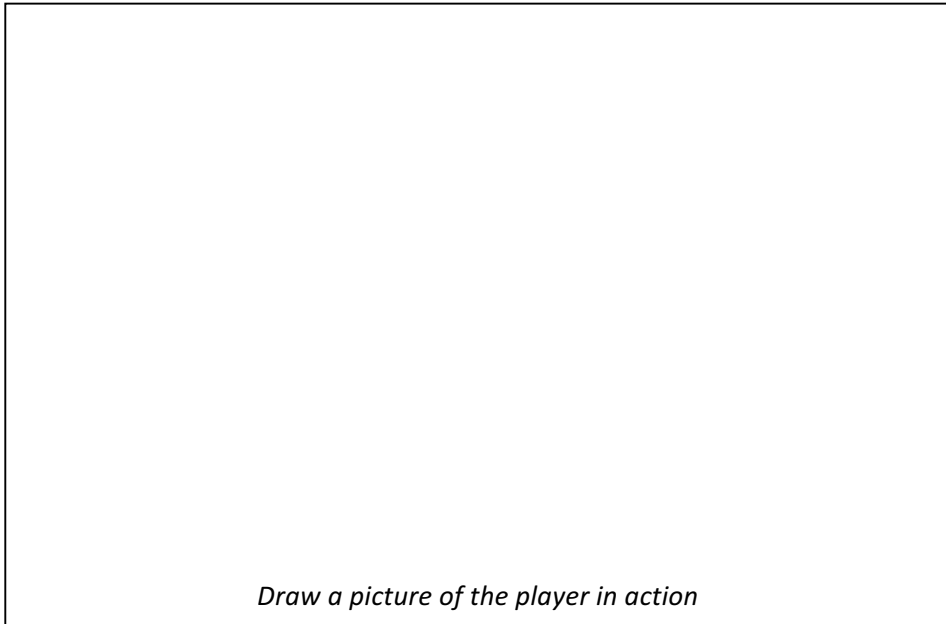

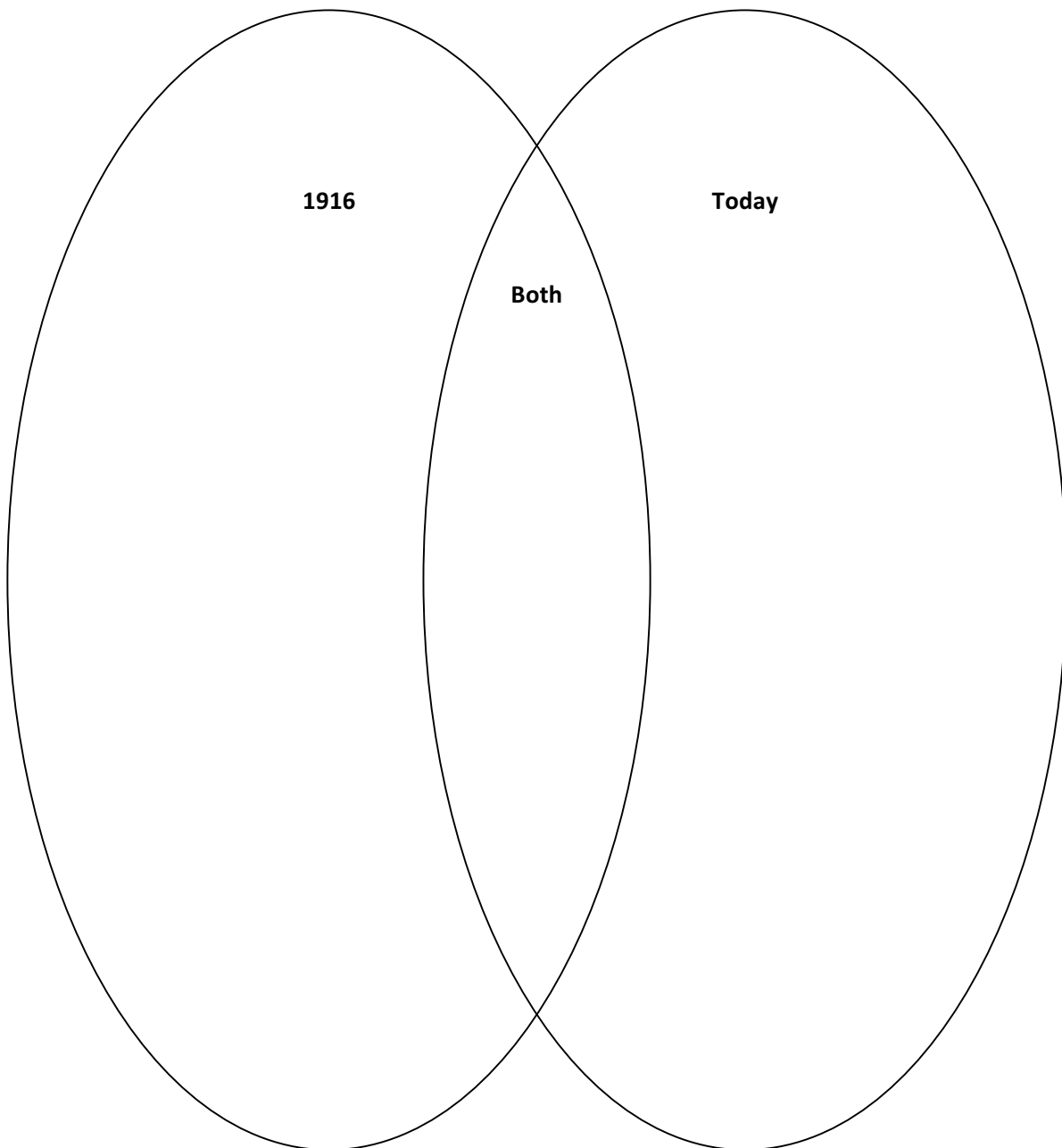
